restoration projects as described in the proposed new 301 CMR 11.01(2)(b)4.

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This proposed revision to MEPA regulations provides an important benefit by exempting qualifying ecological restoration projects from MEPA review. The proposed amendment would satisfy the original intent of 2013 Wetlands Protection Act regulations that establish a Restoration Order of Conditions for such projects by now creating a streamlined notice to be filed with the MEPA Office prior to the project applicant seeking a Restoration Order of Conditions from the local conservation commission. Following the filing of a notice of a Restoration Order of Conditions and 20-day comment period, the secretary of EEA has the discretion to then require the preparation of a project Environmental Notification Form or, if the project meets the qualifications for a MEPA exemption, the project applicant can

instead proceed with the Restoration Order of Conditions application.

project applicant and cause unnecessary delays in projects whose purpose is to improve natural ecological functions and which have no adverse impact on the environment. The proposed change in MEPA regulations will simplify the MEPA review process for those projects that provide a direct public benefit by restoring natural resources. APCC strongly supports the proposed amendment and urges its adoption by the MEPA Office.
