	yearly journey. Unfortunately, Massachusetts has fallen behind in this regard; every
	other state on the East Coast with a significant horseshoe crab population has
	already taken measures to restrict harvesting during the spawning season.

Ultimately, the goal of the Division of Marine Fisheries should be to completely phase out the harvest of horseshoe crabs for use as bait in the whelk fishery, a species that has already been classified as overfished. The continuation of the horseshoe crab harvest for bait contributes to the overexploitation of both horseshoe crabs and whelks, in addition to placing undue stress on vulnerable shorebird species.

APCC urges the Division of Marine Fisheries to move swiftly in adopting the proposed harvesting ban regulation as a first important step in restoring horseshoe crab populations in Massachusetts.
